

2025 | Electric Generation Retirement Report

House Bill 2527, passed by the Kansas Legislature, went into effect July 1, 2024. The bill amends the law regarding electric public utilities and the retirement of nuclear-powered and coal-fired electric generating facilities, as well as reporting requirements of the Kansas Corporation Commission (KCC) pertaining to those events.

The bill requires the KCC to prepare and submit to the Legislature by December 1 of each year an annual report based on the preceding calendar year that provides:

- The number of unit retirement requests in the state
- The nameplate capacity of each of the requested units
- Whether the request was approved or denied by the KCC
- The impact of any KCC-approved retirement of a unit on the:
 - Utility's and state's generation capacity by fuel type
 - Required capacity reserve margins for the utility and the overall capacity reserve margin within the state
 - The utility's need for capacity additions or expansions at new or existing facilities as a result of a unit retirement
 - The utility's need for additional power or capacity reserve arrangements
 - Whether the retirement resulted in stranded costs for ratepayers that will be recovered by the utility through securitization or through some other charge on the customer bill. The provisions of this section of the bill will expire on July 1, 2034.

The Kansas Corporation Commission reports that during the preceding calendar year, no requests to retire electric generating facilities were made to the Commission.
