Written - Neutral Testimony on Senate Bill 380

Chair Fagg, Vice Chair Petersen, Ranking Minority Member Francisco, and members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony today on behalf of the Staff of the Kansas Corporation Commission (KCC or Commission).

The Staff of the Commission (Staff) is neutral towards the passage of SB 380. This bill would prohibit retail electric supplier in Kansas from including in rate base any costs or expenses to “construct, install, own operate, or maintain” any fast-charging electric vehicle (EV) charging station. Additionally, any retail electric supplier that does operate fast-charging EV charging stations would be required to offer “fair, reasonable and nondiscriminatory rates and services to all entities providing similar services and shall not act in a manner that provides unreasonable competitive advantage for the retail electric supplier’s fast charging station.”

The issue of whether retail electric suppliers in Kansas should be prohibited from including in rate base the costs of providing EV charging systems is a policy issue properly within the purview of the Legislature. Staff offers this testimony to provide background and context on how the Commission has previously handled the issue of Transportation Electrification (TE) in previous Dockets. **In Commission Dockets pertaining to TE, Staff has consistently taken the position that the unregulated competitive market should be allowed to fill the role of providing electric vehicle charging systems, to the greatest extent possible.** Staff has also supported ratepayer-funded programs to help the utility manage the impact of TE in a grid-friendly and efficient manner, as well as the use of ratepayer-funded commercial rebates to help spur the competitive market to provide electric vehicle charging services. The Commission has only supported the inclusion of EV charging stations in Rate Base when there is substantial competent evidence that the competitive market was not meeting the need of EV drivers in the area.

The Commission has previously addressed issues surrounding TE in Docket No. 16-KCPE-160-MIS (16-160), 21-EKME-320-TAR (21-320), and 25-EKCE-169-TAR (25-169).

In the 16-160 Docket, the Commission denied Kansas City Power and Light's Application for approval of a plan to include in Rate Base 900 electric vehicle charging stations. The order can be found here:

In the 21-320 Docket, Evergy asked for preapproval of the decision to expand its network of electric vehicle charging stations, which the Commission denied. The Commission did approve a set of tariffs specific to business EV charging services and a tariff specific to electric transit services (electric buses).

The Commission also approved a set of ratepayer-funded rebates to aid in the grid-friendly and efficient implementation of TE in Evergy's service territory, as well as a ratepayer-funded rebate program to spur the competitive development of electric vehicle charging stations in Evergy's territory.

On September 30, 2024, Evergy filed an Application requesting the implementation of a Fleet Advisory Service program, meant to assist businesses in Evergy's service territory in the grid-friendly and efficient adoption of TE at the workplace, as well as a Residential Managed Charging pilot, which is meant to assist EV owners in the grid-friendly and efficient charging of EVs at home. Ultimately all active parties supported a unanimous settlement agreement in this Docket, which contained several terms that were specifically designed to protect the competitive market for third-party (non-utility) fleet advisory services.
